ReCreate Designs Donates Thousands of Handmade Masks to the Tribes and Local Healthcare Workers

CarolyLynn Lapotka, owner of HandMADE MONTANA and ReCreate Designs pivoted during the beginning of the pandemic to sew masks with a mission of providing aid to her community. Since March, CarolyLynn asked the public for donations of 100% cotton fabric to be left in a bin outside of her Polson downtown shop. The community rallied and provided donations to support her shops efforts. Governor Bullock Partners with Tribal Leaders to Increase COVID-19 Testing

Governor Bullock visited community testing events at the Blackfeet, Ft. Belknap, Crow, Chippewa Cree, Ft. Peck, Northern Cheyenne, and Confederated Salish Kootenai tribes during the summer to increase accessible testing. Lt. Governor Cooney visited a testing event with the Little Shell Tribe.

Governor Bullock partnered with tribal governments, tribal and local health offices, Indian Health Services, the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services, and the Montana National Guard to provide each community testing event in tribal communities. Ongoing testing was a critical component to aid each tribe's decision to limit tourism or continue to hold a shelter in place within their communities.

Approximately 7,500 tests were performed from the tribal community testing events.

Montana Coronavirus Relief Funds

On May 7th, Governor Bullock opened an application process for Montana Coronavirus Relief Fund grants. Over the course of 5 months, more grants became available specializing in helping specific industries, businesses, and individuals effected by COVID-19. Nearly 750 tribal members and tribal-owned businesses were awarded grants.

Investment Grants Given to Tribal Nations to Support Small Business Development

This fall, economic development organizations in the eight tribal nations received \$20,000 each in funding to support and bolster tribally owned small businesses in their communities. Each tribal community will be working to support the development of Native-owned small businesses through the Department of Commerce's Native American Business Advisors (NABA) program, an organization that works to equip tribal entrepreneurs and small business owners with the tools and resources to successfully grow and launch a small business. This assistance ranges from financial literacy classes and counseling, to assistance with business plans and small business grants. Funds to date have been given to the following tribal organizations:

- Nakoda-Aaniiih Credit Agency (Ft. Belknap Indian Community)
- Great Northern Development Corporation (Ft. Peck Assiniboine and Sioux Tribes)
- Bear Paw Development Corporation (Chippewa Cree Tribe)
- NACDC Financial Services (Blackfeet Tribe)
- Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians (Little Shell Tribe)
- People's Partners for Community Development (Northern Cheyenne)
- Plenty Doors Community Development Corporation (Crow Tribe)
- CSKT Tribal Economic Development Department (Confederated Salish and Kootenai)



Indian Country Economic Development (ICED) Grant Program

The Indian Country Economic Development (ICED) program has been an integral resource to many local reservation economies by successfully creating and growing tribally owned enterprises and small businesses across the state. Not only has this program been integral in promoting private sector growth, but through its wide range of support, also offers critical assistance to entrepreneurs from business conception to expansion. The Native American Business Advisors (NABA) Service offers business advice and technical assistance to American Indian entrepreneurs and companies in tribal communities through an existing local organization for each tribe in Montana.

This assistance ranges from marketing instruction to fiscal recommendations and education on properly using available technology and resources.

The impact of ICED programs between 2016-2018 has been substantial and includes the support of over **177 businesses** with grant funds, directly, and through the NABA organizations, providing **2,591 clients** with assistance and training, and helping to create or retain **414 tribal jobs**. Additionally, over **77 Indian Equity Fund grants** were awarded to small business entrepreneurs.



Indian Equity Fund: Small Business Grant

The Indian Equity Fund has been an integral resource in forming partnerships with tribal governments by investing in Native American entrepreneurs and small businesses and encouraging economic development in tribal nations for the benefit of tribal communities and members. Earlier this year, \$320,000 in funding was released to support the growth of 25 Native American-owned businesses across Montana through the Indian Equity Fund Small Business Grant program. Each business received between \$7,000 and \$14,000 to help with costs related to land purchases, building, equipment, assets, technology, operational costs, and working capital. These dollars have been a vital investment into the future of local business and tribal communities. Not only do programs like this help to bolster the growth of Native American-owned businesses themselves, but they have also been shown to strengthen the local economies and communities they operate in.





Promoting Entrepreneurship and Job Services

Job Service Montana has been a vital resource for state and tribal collaboration, working to meet the unique needs of each tribal entity across the state through coaching, career assistance, and training/education opportunities. Job service locations across the state have done vital work for the tribes they serve, in particular in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. Below are just a handful of examples of the integral work Job Service Montana has done to assist our tribes in the past year:

- Job Service Miles City: Provided rapid response to COVID-related closures and assisted employers and impacted workers with unemployment insurance and grant work.
- Job Service Wolf Point: Assisted in a wide variety of job resource and education training opportunities for veterans and students.
- Job Service Polson: Connected tribal members with job resources, education and training, and career information.
- Job Service Great Falls: Partnered with the Montana United Indian Alliance under the Workforce Innovation Act to co-enroll and better serve local families.
- Job Service Cut Bank: Assists the community at large with education and business-related services and events.
- Job Service Billings: Provided rapid response to the Crow Tribe during COVID-related layoffs.
- Job Service Havre: Provided employment readiness training for local college students.

Jobs for Montana's Graduates (JMG) program

The Jobs for Montana's Graduates (JMG) program has been a vital resource for Native American students as they prepare to graduate from high school to join the workforce, attend college, or serve in the armed forces. The ultimate objective of JMG is for students to secure a quality job and/or post-secondary education or training that will lead to a meaningful career. JMG assists students to stay in school through graduation and helps secure their success by acquiring employability competencies. Students selected for JMG have barriers to successfully completing high school and/or entry into a job. The program committed to working with Native American students across the state to overcome these barriers and assist them in joining the workforce.

This past year, JMG has continued to work with Fort Peck Community College (FPCC) to support students in their career development, to practice and understand the skills needed for employment, and to promote staying in school to obtain credentials for advancement in their career choices.

- The implementation was conducted in partnership with FPCC and JMG staff.
- The outcomes- an increased number of students who participated. Completion rates grew from four to eighteen students.
- Each student created a Career Portfolio that included students speaking to potential employers, setting goals, and creating a plan of how to gain the credentials needed for their career.
- Additional data will be collected for the upcoming year to evaluate how many participants stayed in school, obtained credentials, and became employed.

JMG has also partnered with OPI's Indian Education for All program to better serve students at schools on reservations. Arlee, Lame Deer, Nashua, and Culbertson JMG classes provided "Youth Entrepreneur" programming during the 2019-20 school year. JMG will continue to encourage and support the practice of youth entrepreneurship. Notable statistics for this program can be found below:

For the 2018-19 school year JMG graduate outcomes:

- 87% graduated
- 83% procured full-time employment
- 95% full-time placement in training, post-secondary, military, employment, or a combination of these categories.



NASAA Professional Development Institute

Each year, with support from the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies (NASAA) gathers Arts Education Managers for a Professional Development Institute (PDI). Last year—based on a proposal submitted by the Montana Arts Council—the Missoula area was chosen as the site for PDI 2019. Colleagues from 34 states plus D.C traveled to Missoula to participate in the convening, the primary days of which were October 2 and 3, split equally between Missoula and Pablo.

With a guiding question of ‘How can state arts agency arts education managers adapt their agencies’ policies and practices to respond more effectively to diverse communities?’ attendees participated in sessions focused on asset-based approaches toward engagement with—and serving the needs of—rural, remote and tribal communities.

First-day sessions in Missoula were held in various arts organization spaces in the city; a discussion with panelists from across our arts education ecosystem, including Native American poet and journalist Jennifer Finley and Mike Jetty, Indian Education Specialist at the Montana OPI. Day one culminated in a dinner event at the Payne Family Native American Center on the University of Montana campus and featured poetry readings by UM Native American Studies faculty member Heather Cahoon, among other guests.

Day two of the PDI offered participants an immersive experience in Pablo that included a presentation by Cameron Decker, head of SKC’s Art Department, an introduction by Corky Clairmont to the Eagle Circle Veterans Wall of Remembrance, a panel discussion with several Montana Teacher Leaders in the Arts, and a collaborative artmaking experience that relied on symbol making. The focus on ‘rural, remote and tribal’ meant that the content and conversations were not only relevant to our work in Montana but offered an opportunity to discuss what our arts education work in Montana holds in common with the work of other states. Many attendees appreciated the authenticity of their PDI experience, in large part due to the day spent in Pablo.



Main Street Montana- Rural Partners

Since 2013, the Main Street Project has focused on engaging and assisting tribal communities. The first phase of Main Street Montana Indian Country saw significant success, from establishing a Tribal Apprenticeship Program to increasing collaboration across state agencies to work more effectively with tribal communities. Notable outcomes of the Main Street Montana Rural Partners project in tribal communities to date have included:

- Providing both state and federal resource for various priorities including broadband, food sovereignty, opportunity zones, renewable energy, and business development to tribal stakeholders based on priorities.
- Partnering with Deloitte Consulting and No Kid Hungry on a project looking at how connectivity can enhance food security on the Rocky Boy Reservation. The intention of the project was to enhance the understanding of the current challenges the community is facing, with specific attention on connectivity and food security challenges, and strengthen the case for investment in connectivity as a critical enabler to address the food security challenges and optimize existing food security programs and efforts. We continued to work with the Tribal Food Sovereignty group, No Kid Hungry, and Deloitte Consulting as food security become an even greater concern in light of COVID-19.
- Extensive work with the Crow Reservation, MSU, and MT State Parks on potential solutions for infrastructure upgrades at Plenty Coup State Park. Met with stakeholders in winter 2020 to discuss the situation and potential solutions. In March 2020, the Parks and Recreation Board approved moving forward with the design efforts for a new wastewater treatment system at Chief Plenty Coups State Park. MT State Parks is also working on installing one or more groundwater monitoring wells as a part of the DEQ permitting process for the project.
- Connecting the Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians with Montana Board of Investments for potential funding of travertine quarry.
- Compiling a Tribal and Economic Development Initiatives Report highlighting what tribal communities across both the state and country are doing to innovate and make strides towards increasing economic opportunities in a number of sectors.



BETTER EDUCATION



2020 Human Trafficking Symposium & MMIW Awareness

On February 29, 2020, the Flathead Valley Community College student group, Native American Student Association (NASA), co-sponsored with the Montana Human Rights Network/Love Lives Here, a free to the public, day-long informational symposium and training around the fight against Human Trafficking in Montana. Special emphasis was placed on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW). A training followed the symposium. The training raised awareness of human trafficking nationwide and locally, as well as what is being done locally to combat trafficking. One goal was to help participants be equipped with knowledge to help the average person recognize red flags, warning signs, and steps to take when you suspect or encounter a victim. This event helped to build on the MMIW event last year that was co-hosted by the Montana American Indian Scholars Program (MAIS) and Love Lives Here.

Symposium/Training Agenda

Sharing of data, statistics and stories of the impact of human trafficking and connection to Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women movement.

She is a member of the Blackfeet tribe, advocate for the prevention of childhood sexual abuse; "Tara's Law", created a comprehensive educational component for schools to teach about sexual abuse prevention and was signed by Gov. Bullock in 2017
- Representative from the Flathead County Sheriff's Office
- Chief Overman from the Kalispell Police Department
- Representatives from DeliverFund

Training was provided by the Lifeguard Group – a non-profit group from Missoula that works in collaboration with Law Enforcement Agencies and communities to fight human trafficking and support restoration for victims.

Impact of 2020 Human Trafficking Symposium & MMIW Awareness

Providing cultural and educational opportunities for the campus and greater community is a part of the MAIS Program mission. Approximately 80 were in attendance. The audience was made up of students, college staff, community members (including a number of teachers and health care professionals) and those who traveled from out of the area. Certificates for CEU's were available for behavioral health professionals. This event helped participants learn about issues impacting tribal communities and steps being taken to address missing persons and human trafficking.

New Home for the Montana Historical Society

Instead of a “groundbreaking” the new Montana Heritage Center celebrated the beginning of its construction with a “ground blessing.” The ceremony ended with Steve Lozar, a member of the Historical Society Board and a member of the Confederated Salish, Kootenai, and Assiniboiné Tribes, performing a smudging and a blessing at the new location. The Heritage Center, an addition to the Montana Historical Society building which is located next to the Capitol Building, is expected to be completed in 2024 and will involve a renovation of the original building. It will be a place for Montanans and visitors alike to learn about Montana’s colorful and often complex history while looking to the future. It is the first new building on the Capitol Complex in 40 years. Through the projects Tribal Outreach program, tribal communities have, and will continue to have, opportunities to be involved in the architectural design process as well as exhibit designs.

Artists in Schools and Communities (AISC) Grantee Partnerships

Bigger Sky Kids (B!SK) – Wolf Point

For a second consecutive year, AISC funds in FY20 supported this new Wolf Point nonprofit organization to provide art instruction during after-school hours to students in need. Already having worked with B!SK in the previous year, teaching artist Cathryn Reitler had established

an excellent relationship with many of the class attendees and B!SK staff, during her 2018 residency. She was able to build easily on that experience. Children learn best by doing, but also by observing. Cathryn's skill as a role model for youth was clearly evident as the prior attendees provided consistent, valuable peer-to-peer modeling for new and younger students. This collaboration was truly inspiring. On days when Cathryn was not present, the older students were able to mentor and assist younger attendees with minimal adult oversight. The relationships they developed will no doubt last a lifetime.

A skilled artist and teacher, Cathryn relates well to the kids. She doesn't categorize them, just accepts them, encourages them and sticks with them. And they respond. They overcame their reticence and abandoned their restraints. They learned not only to draw and paint but what it means to be an artist—and, what's more, they learned that they, too,

Language Preservation

As in years previous, the Department of Commerce’s Office of Tourism and Business Development continues to work on the Montana Indian Language program. This program is dedicated to preserving and protecting Montana’s tribal languages and identities. One notable feature of this program is the Montana Tribal Nations Language Apps, which can be found at www.marketmt.com/MILP are a great resource for both native and non-native speakers to learn about the language and cultures of the tribes that call Montana home.

Educating the Voice of Young Photographers

The nonprofit entity A VOICE has been providing photography instruction to students from Two Eagle River School since 2006 when, in association with the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes, the ongoing A VOICE Project began. In the years since, artist and photographer David Spear has taught students about the fundamentals of photography while also providing opportunities to show their work locally and nationally. Through A VOICE, students have broadened their horizons through collaborative work and exhibits with students from other areas of the country and some have taken part in recent trips to New York and New Mexico. Within the past year, students opened an exhibition of their photographs in the professional gallery space as well as the student gallery space of the brand new Zootown Arts Community Center (ZACC) in Missoula.

Higher Education

Montana's Tribal Colleges and Universities faced unprecedented challenges this year, but during these uncertain times gave us reasons to celebrate and look forward the future. One such reason is the announcement of Aaniiih Nakoda College's new president, Sean Chandler. He takes over for his mother, Carole Falcon-Chandler, who served the students, staff, and community for 28 years during her tenure as President and as Dean of Student Affairs. We wish both President Chandler and ANC a long and bright future.

Dawson Community College

New Professional Development Req. for Staff

Dawson Community College hosted a summer-long professional development opportunity for staff (required) and faculty (encouraged). This online class, Introduction to Native American Studies: Building Essential Understandings, provided "basic background information about Montana tribes, the federal policies that have affected them, and their contemporary experience." (NASX191 Syllabus, Baldwin, 2020). We are hopeful that this will impact the ways in which DCC staff and faculty relate to and understand the context of the American Indian experience.

Montana State University - Great Falls College

American Indians Scholars Program

The American Indian Scholars Program works to improve persistence rates of Native American students by providing opportunities for personal and professional development in a supportive group setting, representative of collectivistic cultural values. One of the goals of the scholars' group is to create peer mentors with the knowledge of school and community resources. Participation in the program entitles students to a stipend recognizing their service to the community. The amount of stipend increases after the first semester of participation. A \$100 stipend is earned for the first semester (training period), and a \$150 stipend each subsequent semester. The stipend is paid at the end of each term based on satisfactory performance of expectations. Satisfactory performance is defined as:

- Attending at least 70% of group activities including academic, leadership, and personal growth skills workshops, events, and meetings
- Serving as a mentor to others by making contact information available and responding to inquiries
- Promoting group events

In addition to the financial benefits, scholars receive:
Recognition by both the GFC administration and the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education Development of leadership and professional skills.

Showcasing Tribal Flags

Great Falls is home to many American Indians across the state. Each of the 12 tribal nations of Montana is diverse in their languages, cultures, histories, and governments. As a campus community GFC MSU recognizes the diverse traditional beliefs and spirituality of each tribal nation, values their identity, and understands the significance of tribal sovereignty by displaying each of the flags on our campus.

The Montana Tribal Flags Represent Each of the Tribal Nations

Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes, Blackfeet Tribe, Little Shell Chippewa Tribe, Chippewa Cree Tribe, Gros Ventre and Assiniboiné Tribes, Assiniboiné and Sioux Tribes, Northern Cheyenne Tribe, and the Crow Tribe. The tribal flags of Montana's Tribal Nations were hung in the atrium at Great Falls College MSU to recognize and honor our students' tribal affiliations.

American Indian Scholars Program

Great Falls College received a \$1563 mini grant to further implement the American Indian Scholars Program on our campus. The Director, Katherine Meier, submitted the winning proposal.

International Traditional Games Society

Kati Antonich and Deana Leader organized a women's empowerment society and mentorship for Native American women and girls. The society collaborated with Great Falls College in reaching out to local Native American women and girls.

Native American Eagle Feather Ceremony

Seven eligible Fall, Spring, and Summer Native American graduates of Great Falls College received a beaded Eagle feather in 2 separate ceremonies; one on June 18, 2020, and the other on July 13, 2020. Jackie Bread assisted the College's faculty, staff, and students in beading 7 Eagle feathers in the College's colors: blue, yellow, and white in various designs. Each ceremony included a prayer and blessing, blessing of the feathers, transfer ceremony, closing remarks, and honor circle, prayer and song. Those officiating the ceremony were tribal elders: Don Fish and Dugan Coburn.



Helena College University of Montana

Permanent Flag Display

Helena College's permanent display of Montana's Tribal Flags was kicked off with a Tribal Flag Blessing on September 27, 2019. Helena College hosted Mike Jetty, Indian Education Specialist, Curriculum and Materials Development Lead Worker from OPI to bless the new Montana Tribal Flags that will be on permanent display in the student center on the Donaldson campus. The AIMA Committee and the Diversity and Inclusion Committee welcome all to attend the blessing. Light refreshments were served. Helena College recognizes the distinct and unique Tribes of Montana and the need for colleges and universities in our state to acknowledge the uneven history between the United States and the eight Tribes in the State of Montana. The permanent display of Montana's Tribal Flags on both campuses is a visual demonstration of Helena College's commitment to the success of American Indian students and to the success of our larger American Indian communities. We only wish we invested and displayed these flags sooner.

Montana State University - Billings

Sweat Lodge

The overall purpose of the Plains Sweat Lodge is to ground students, faculty, staff, guests, tribal visitors, in Plains native culture. It is also a tool for recruitment and retention of Native American students. The sweat lodge is important across many tribal culture areas.

The sweat lodge has been utilized by students, faculty, staff, and community members. Sweat Lodge Ceremonies were held on an almost weekly basis from November, through February. Participants included all Montana tribes, with numerous attendees from Crow, Cheyenne, Sioux, Assiniboine, and Chippewa nations. As Billings is home to a diverse urban Native American population, there were also people from other tribes outside of Montana that attended including Iroquois, Navajo, and Seminole. The Mayor of Billings, Honorable Bill Cole, also participated in a sweat. Sweat Lodge Ceremonies for groups were also held, including ROTC, Facilities Services, University Police Department, and many others. To date, 16 sweats have been held with an average of 10 people per sweat.

Interim Director McGeshick with the MSU Billings Foundation raised over \$12,000 in cash and in-kind donations with \$7,000 coming from the Billings 100 (a group of women leaders), \$2,000 from the Billings Community Foundation, and \$5,000 from private donors and in-kind contributions



Native American Achievement Center (NAAC)

The purpose of MSU Billings' Native American Achievement Center (NAAC), as well as the Native American Studies Program, is to recruit and retain Native American students and serve as an advocate and outreach platform to Montana's Indian Reservation communities and their populations. Included in this mission are the thousands of tribal individuals living in the Billings urban area. Over the past year the NAAC has sponsored over 20 activities and events on campus, within the city of Billings, and on several Montana Indian reservations.

Starting in July of 2019 and continuing through the academic year, the center has hosted activities such as holiday parties (e.g., Thanksgiving, Halloween, etc.) for students and their families. The center also partnered with local Native American agencies such as the Native American Development Corporation and the Billings Urban Indian Health and Wellness Center on several events throughout the academic year. A complete list of events can be found later in this report under the headings of Campus Events, Local Community Events, Statewide Events, and Student Events.

Billings Powwow

The prize money participants win is taken back to their reservation communities. Over 5,000 Native Americans attended the Powwow in 2019. There are thousands of tribal individuals living in the Billings urban area, as Billings is the largest Native American community in the state, therefore the Billings community benefits financially as well. Hosting the Powwow on the MSUB campus plants seeds for education of Native American youth which has great benefit to tribal communities and the state of Montana.

Montana State University - Northern Staff Attend Summit in Denver

Montana State University Northern staff attended the NASNTI/WICHE/LUMINA Summit in Denver, Co and served on a panel of educators from various universities and the Executive Director of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

Montana Technological University Safety of Dams Program

The Montana Bureau of Mines and Geology (MBMG) operates the 42-station Montana Regional Seismograph Network. The Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes' (CSKT) Safety of Dams Program operates seven of these seismograph stations along with computers used to record and analyze the collected seismic data. The tribal stations were installed in 1995 to monitor seismic activity around the high-hazard dams on the Flathead Reservation. Following significant local earthquakes (magnitude 3.5 or larger), tribal authorities are provided the time, location, and magnitude information. Using this information, tribal authorities determine which dams may require post-earthquake inspections. CSKT purchased the original seismic monitoring equipment and covers maintenance and operational expenses. Through an annual cooperative agreement, the CSKT provides about \$25,000 to MBMG for seismic data analysis, reporting and archival, and equipment repair and operation. The Montana earthquake catalog compiled using these data is included updates of the US Geological Survey's National Seismic Hazard Map, upon which the National Building Code is based.



University of Montana

The American Indian Governance and Policy Institute (AIGPI)

The American Indian Governance and Policy Institute (AIGPI) brings the Montana University System's research and service resources to work with tribes in Montana to address the core causes of poor socioeconomic health on reservations by providing the necessary support for evidence-informed tribal policymaking. AIGPI provides tribal leaders with credible, in-depth research and analysis of tribal-level policies. This collaborative, data-backed approach will enhance tribal governing structures by increasing effective functioning, regulatory authority and self-governing abilities and further tribal leaders' efforts to strengthen reservation economies and build individual and community health and prosperity.

AIGPI is housed within the Native American Studies Department at the University of Montana (UM) under the leadership of Heather Cahoon, PhD, and in partnership with UM's nationally-recognized Alexander Blewett III, School of Law, Margery Hunter Brown, Indian Law Clinic, and the Department of Public Administration and Policy's Master of Public Administration program, located within the Max Baucus Institute.

To date, AIGPI has operated primarily using University of Montana funds that pay for AIGPI core faculty salaries, as well as from a \$26,500 planning grant from Headwaters Foundation and is currently working on the development of a comprehensive tribal public policy needs assessment using a \$99,956 grant from the Montana Healthcare Foundation.



AIGPI is still in its beginning phase, however, once the tribal public policy needs assessments have been completed, we will work with tribal governments to develop tribal-level policies that impact the full range of social determinants of health in their communities. This includes policies related to internal government structures and functions, social and health issues, revenue generation and economic development, among other topics requested by tribal leaders. It is highly likely that some of these policies will impact state-tribal relations, and it is certain that they will positively impact Indian people and tribal communities in Montana. AIGPI research and analysis work will also help educate local, state and federal policymakers and the broader public on an array of complex policy matters relating to American Indians that have real quality of life implications on reservations across the country. Additionally, through an active learning environment tribal community members and student leaders will gain a comprehensive understanding of the tribal policymaking process, how various levels of policy interact, and how outdated, unresponsive and harmful public policies can be reengineered to encourage systems that support socioeconomic health and tribal sovereignty.

The Collaborative Language Planning Project (CLPP)

University of Montana and Chief Dull Knife College collaborated in establishing a network among language workers, language teachers, language activists from the tribal colleges in Montana to create venues to discuss and exchange experiences and ideas for the communities' language revitalization efforts. The Collaborative Language Planning Project (CLPP) is funded by the NSF -Documenting Endangered Languages (DEL) program awarded to the University of Montana, the DEL program, Tribal Colleges, and University Project (TCUP) program awarded to Chief Dull Knife College.

Six Montana tribal colleges participated in the CLPP project: Aaniiih Nakoda College, Blackfeet Community College, Chief Dull Knife College, Fort Peck Community College, Salish Kootenai College, and Stone Child College. The project conducted small conferences with the stakeholders and offered onsite workshops previously. These events are made available for CEU so that Class 7 teachers were able to earn credits. During the report period (July 2019 -June 2020), one onsite workshop was being planned to be held at the Stone Child College in April. However, the workshop was cancelled due to the coronavirus pandemic. In May, instead of a meeting to be held in Missoula, stakeholders including linguists and tribal college's liaisons had an online meeting on Zoom and discussed impacts of the pandemic on their schools and activities as well as talked about plans on collaborative projects.

Montana Heritage Collections/Tribal Historic Preservation Summits

The University of Montana Heritage Collections/Tribal Historic Preservation Summits; these Summits had just evolved into a larger Heritage Collections Board, becoming UM's first Board of its kind, including representatives from all Montana's Tribal Colleges and Tribal Preservation Offices, as well as Tribal artists connected with the MMAC. This inaugural meeting of the University of Montana's Heritage Collections Board (UMHCB) was scheduled to take place during April of



2020, amid the first COVID-19 pandemic wave. Thus, we had to cancel that historically exciting event and postpone. As of late summer 2020, we have not yet rescheduled and are exploring options for a Zoom-style meeting and hoping to convene this annual event in-person sometime in the future, once everyone's safety at such events can be ensured.

Since 2015, the UMACF has hosted annual summits with Montana's Tribal Historic Preservation Officers (THPOs) and Cultural Heritage representatives to jointly collaborate on the appropriate handling, care, and management of Native American cultural heritage objects in UM's Anthropological "Museum" collections. We have been able to host these Summits in 2016, 2018, and 2019 primarily through grant funding. These truly collaborative efforts are rare in the museum world, and our efforts and insights gained from the partnerships has garnered the attention of museum organizations such as the Museum Association of Montana (MAM) and national publications.



During the summer of 2019, a private donor stepped forward, offering to gift several million dollars to the MMAC under the condition that they construct a new facility that would allow MMAC to be better allied with UM's Anthropological Collections. That gift sparked a series of events that inspired us to take the platform of our collections THPO Summits and turn it into the University of Montana's first Heritage Collections Board (UMHCB) composed primarily of representatives of Tribal nations and colleges situated in Montana and representatives from the UMACF, MMAC, and the Office of the President. Among the charges of the newly formed UMHCB is to determine how UM can better serve Tribal cultural heritage leaders and to support Tribal students via internships and distance learning options.

American Indian Student Services (AISS)

The AISS department at the University of Montana's (UM) mission is "to provide a welcoming and inviting environment for Native American students and assist them with their transition, achievement, and success while at University of Montana." AISS assists or connects students with services that that will help them to be successful in their college career while at UM. AISS provides services and programming that have been established through collaborative partnerships with various campus and Missoula community entities, i.e. coordination with the UM Native American Studies (NAS) Department for the "Art Reveal" of the gift provided to Native American graduates in the class of 2020 AISS also coordinates with the All Nations Health Center (ANHC), who donated laptops when our Native American students transitioned to classes fully online during the Covid-19 pandemic.



University of Montana - Western

Partnering for Educators

We have been working closely with Blackfeet Community College and the Browning and Heart Butte Schools to prepare educators from the community schools. School leaders are recruited to teach face-to-face classes and create immersive field experiences. Participants earn their bachelors' degrees from UMW and are licensed in Pre-K3, elementary education, special education and secondary education (post bacc). Blackfeet schools hired 100% of program graduates, and over four years, the teacher retention rate has been over 90%. At least one school in Browning is now 50% staffed by this partnership.

In the spring of 2020, UMW partnered with Little Big Horn College and the Hardin, Lodge Grass and St. Labre schools to prepare elementary educators in community schools serving 80-100% Native American children. The delivery model replicates that developed with BCC and the Browning/Heart Butte Schools.

These projects have been funded through external sources. Over \$2M was funded by the US Department of Education since 2016. Some Tribal candidates received Pell grants and other scholarships. Additional funding was raised through the UMW Foundation to support (\$205,000). Two supporting grants were funded through INBRE (\$180,000) and an iGraduate grant (\$10,000) was funded by the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education to support High Schoolers interest in the teaching profession.

MORE EFFECTIVE GOVERNMENT



Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians of Montana Receives Federal Recognition

In December 2019, after a 125-year long fight, the Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians of Montana finally received overdue federal recognition of their sovereign nation. On December 20, 2019, Governor Bullock signed a proclamation commemorating December 20th, 2019 as the day the Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians became federally recognized.

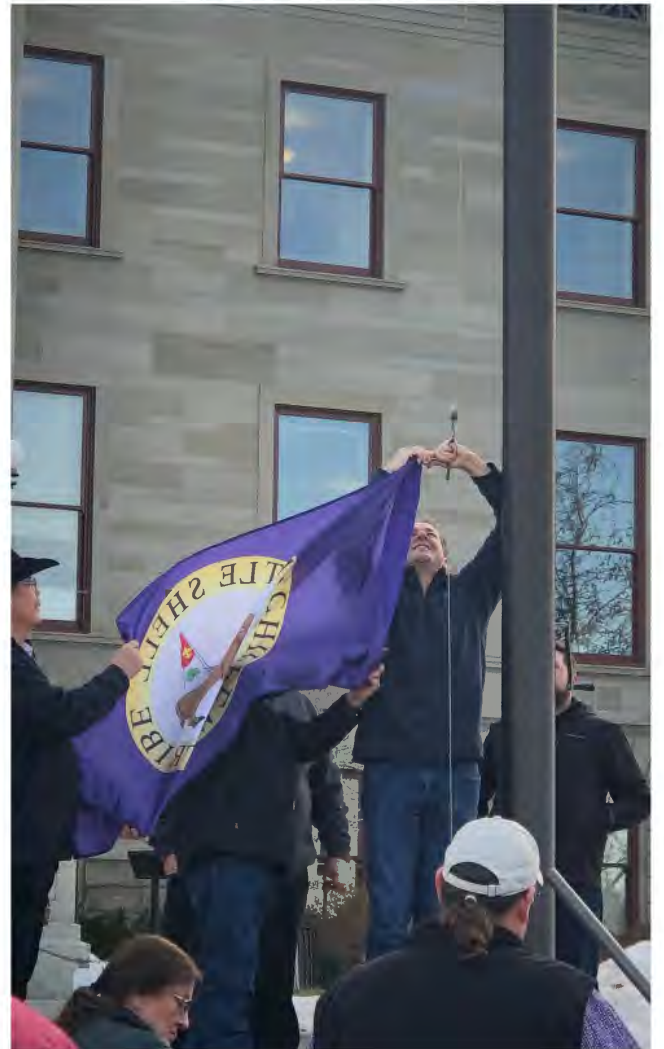
Governor Steve Bullock, Senator Jon Tester and leaders of the Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians of Montana gathered in Helena to sign the proclamation and raise the Little Shell Flag above the Montana Capitol Building. Singers and drummers joined the gathering, performing two songs and a blessing was shared.

In late January, the Little Shell hosted a celebration in Great Falls. Thousands came to join in the celebration. Governor Bullock and Lt. Governor Cooney spoke to the crowded room about the significance of this recognition and long-awaited legislation. Gifts were shared with the Tribal Council to pay tribute to the tribe and this new step forward.

President Fawn Sharp Visits Montana as Keynote for 2020 Tribal Relations Training

President Sharp, the 23rd President of the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI), the oldest, largest and most representative American Indian and Alaska Native tribal government organization in the country, joined Governor Bullock for the 2020 Tribal Relations Training in February. The event was most attended in its history, selling out at 600 attendees. President Sharp shared insight into her position and an overview of our country's tribal nations to the packed theater. She then sat down with Governor Bullock for a fireside chat on leadership. Tribal leaders joined the president in the Governor's reception room for an informal meet-and-greet prior to the training, noted as one of the first opportunities Montana Tribal Leaders have had to visit with an NCAI president independently for an extended time.





Building Starts on Tribal Flag Plaza

Building has begun on the Montana state Capitol Tribal Flag Plaza, honoring Montana's 8 Tribal Nations in the front of the Capitol grounds.

The Capitol Flag Plaza was approved with strong bipartisan support with the passage of House Bill 524 by Democratic Representative Marvin Weatherwax of Browning, Montana. The \$644,000 plaza will include the 8 Tribal Nations flags, the U.S. Flag, and the Montana state flag with a handicap access ramp and an area to convene.

The design was developed in a collaboration between the governor's office, the Department of Administration, and Stahly Engineering of Helena. Plaques will be placed on each of the flag poles with the tribe's name in English and their native language to honor their ancestry.

The Tribal Flag Plaza officially opened in October 2020 with a ceremony blessing the new grounds and each tribal flag was raised by a member of the tribe.





Long Range Building Program

Wolf Point 9-Bay Equipment Storage Building was completed in August 2019.

3% of every contractor pay request was held by A&E for payment to the Fort Peck Tribe upon completion.

Project was funded by state special revenue from MDT and appropriated through the Long-Range Building Program. State construction projects located on reservations must include hiring preference for residents of Indian Reservations as required by 18-1-110, MCA.

These requirements are specific to each reservation and are included in the contract along with the Fort Peck Tribes Indian Preference Ordinance Regulations.

Wolf Point HQ Office

Remodel of the Montana Department of Transportation Wolf Point Headquarters Office was appropriated by the 66th legislature with a budget of \$770,000 and is funded with MDT State Special Revenue. The project will remodel the existing MDT office in Wolf Point and convert the existing mechanics shop into office space. The project has not been initiated and a design consultant has not been selected; the construction bid has not been scheduled.

Projects are funded by state special revenue from MDT and appropriated through the Long-Range Building Program. State construction projects located on reservations must include hiring preference for residents of Indian Reservations as required by 18-1-110, MCA. These requirements are specific to each reservation and are included in the contract along with the Fort Peck Tribes Indian Preference Ordinance Regulations.

Revenue Sharing Agreements

Montana tribes received about \$4.98 million in fiscal year 2020 from revenue sharing agreements with the Montana Department of Revenue. The agreements for shared tobacco and alcohol tax revenue serve more than 45,000 enrolled tribal members. The department distributes the revenue on a quarterly basis to the tribes.

Six tribes benefit from shared tobacco tax money that total more than \$4.2 million. They are Blackfeet, Chippewa Cree, Crow, Fort Belknap, Fort Peck, and Northern Cheyenne. Four tribes enjoy shared alcohol tax revenue that amounts to approximately \$724,000. They are Blackfeet, CSKT, Fort Belknap, and Fort Peck. Three tribes receive both tobacco and alcohol tax revenue. They are Blackfeet, Fort Belknap, and Fort Peck.



Emission Reduction

The DEQ Energy Planning & Renewable Energy Section has awarded two Diesel Emission Reduction Act (DERA) grants (with funding from EPA) for school bus replacements to school districts on reservations. The Charlo School District School District purchased 1 Low NOx propane school bus, at a cost of \$31,500.

On July 17, 2019, DEQ furnished the boat and manpower to complete a survey of the lagoon for nutrients and sludge levels in the lagoons for Crow Agency. The work was completed under Steve Harris of HS Environmental of Mesa AZ. Steve had a contact with the EPA/Tribe to complete a lagoon Nutrient, Sludge and maintenance survey of the treatment system.

Water Rights

DNRC's WRD has committed approximately \$154,000 (2020-2022) toward water measurement projects that support our tribal compact partners. These projects are beneficial to the State, state-based water users and our tribal compact partners. These compact related water measurement activities include acquisition, installation and maintenance of stream gage equipment in the Blackfoot River basin (CSKT-MT Compact) but primarily involve cooperative funding toward water measurement through USGS joint-funding agreements (currently Blackfeet, Northern Cheyenne and Chippewa Cree). These joint funding agreements are administered by the Wyoming-Montana Water Science Center and are joint efforts between the USGS, tribal communities, and the DNRC-WRD Compact Program staff. The results of work performed under this agreement will be available for publication by the U.S. Geological Survey. In addition, this work is beneficial as it provides critical water management data that will inform the compact parties and water user stakeholders as large tribal water develop projects develop. The DNRC-WRD looks forward to continuing this and future cooperative efforts that implement the state's water compacts and benefit our tribal community partners and state-based water users.



Safe On All Roads (SOAR)

Safe On All Roads (SOAR) – The purpose of this program is to educate tribal communities on the dangers of impaired driving and the importance of seat belt use. Program messages and communications are developed within the community to resonate to each individual culture. A local coordinator identifies outreach opportunities and acts as a spokesperson and advocate for traffic safety on each reservation.

Law enforcement from Fort Belknap and other stakeholders on the Blackfeet, Rocky Boy, and Fort Peck Reservations have formed the Northern Tribes DUI Task Force to collaborate on tribal efforts to reduce impaired- and/or drug-related traffic crashes impacting their communities through education and enforcement.

In addition, funds are provided to Tribal Law Enforcement agencies for high visibility enforcement activities through the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP). These activities provide funding for traffic safety patrols that specifically enforce DUI and seat belt laws.

These programs are funded through MDT's Highway Traffic Safety Program and range from \$29,000 to \$56,000 annually, depending on the Tribe requests. During 2020, this funding totaled \$361,875.

Montana Conservation Seedling Nursery (DNRC)

The Montana Conservation Seedling Nursery has been growing seedlings on a contract basis for the Northern Cheyenne Tribe for over 25 years now. This year the Northern Cheyenne Tribe received 341,909 Seedlings from the Montana Conservation Seedling Nursery. The Northern Cheyenne Tribe paid the Nursery \$119,668.15 for these seedlings and other costs (such as delivery and seed cleaning). Currently the Nursery has a contract to delivery seedlings to the NCT in Spring of 2021.

The Chippewa Cree Tribe had a contract with the Montana Conservation Seedling Nursery for fiscal year 2020 to produce just over 18,000 seedlings. The Nursery shipped out 19,271 seedlings and received \$19,078.29 in return for payment.

Currently there are no future contracts with the Chippewa Cree for seedlings. Fort Peck Tribes Environmental office has purchased a few seedlings off and on over a few years now from the Nursery.

These seedlings are not contract grown but purchased through our General Nursery Sales. In 2020 the Nursery sent 1800 seedlings to the Fort Peck Tribes and received \$1884.87 in total.

Blackfeet Environmental typically purchases seedlings from our general sales, however, in 2020 they had to cancel their order due to the reservation being shut down due to COVID.



The Pesticide Container Recycling Program Montana

The Pesticide Container Recycling Program was created to keep pesticide container plastic out of Montana's landfills. The program's truck travels to predetermined collection sites to collect and grind clean pesticide container plastic. Only #2 High Density polyethylene pesticide container plastic is accepted.

A memorandum of Agreement between Lake County Weed Control, the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes and the Department of Agriculture was developed for a local recycling option to reduce hazard and provide an option to recycle pesticide containers on the Flathead Reservation. This site is located at the Lake County Weed District in Polson.

The Pesticide Container Recycling program impacts the reservations' environmental footprint. Every pesticide container gathered is recycled instead of collecting in landfills. The program is open and free for all individuals. The Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribe's collection site located at the Lake County Weed district collected **approximately 1,996 lbs. of pesticide plastic last year.**

Montana Growth Through Agriculture (GTA) Program

The Montana Growth Through Agriculture (GTA) program was created by the 1987 Legislature and is administered by the seven-member Montana Agriculture Development Council (Council), which is attached to the Department of Agriculture. The legislative purpose of the program is to strengthen and diversify Montana's agricultural industry through loans and grants to assist the development of innovative agricultural business organizational improvements and the commercialization and marketing of new agricultural products in order to keep pace with a transforming agricultural industry and to create new jobs and expand small business opportunities.

The following projects, awarded GTA funds in FY 2020, are on or impact tribal areas:

- Green Ridge Biosolutions – Ronan, MT (Flathead Reservation): \$45,000 for hemp extraction capacity growth through equipment acquisition and building expansion
- Mountain Meat Shares – Arlee, MT (Flathead Reservation): \$1,460 for a trailer with freezers for expanded delivery.
- Awesome Acres – St. Ignatius, MT (Flathead Reservation): \$4,857 to enable online and wholesale sales for the certified herb drying facility.
- Lowdown Farm – Charlo, MT (Flathead Reservation): \$493 to help purchase produce packaging to adapt to COVID-19 affected markets.
